

If California contractors are following the new law of their land, they should be pulling a building permit every time they come to install or replace a central air conditioner or furnace in a household. However, in an informal survey of cities across the great state of California, not one city official noted a spike in the issuance of building permits since Title 24 went into effect Oet 1 2005











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
